This is not a view that is based on systematic evaluation and, as this paper argues, there are good reasons for believing it to be misplaced. Just as many of those industries failed to deliver economic efficiency or, often, even a service to customers - so nationalised land development rights and the large element of administrative discretion in land use planning do not seem to be delivering results in a way that is either cost-effective or in line with what people actually want. book.
